## Pastor's Reflection

Once upon a time I remember a class discussion where the question was posed, "What makes a house a home?" The answers were varied and interesting. They went something like this: "A house is not a home until the family or friends gather at the table. A house is not a home until memories \_\_ are made there, love is shared and forgiveness given." One person said, "A house becomes a home when it is a place of solace, refuge, comfort and rest. Home is that place where you go to be restored, renewed, and to grow. Another said, "A house becomes and remains a home as long as love resides The consensus was if some combination of these things were not present, then a house was little more than a dorm. You can imagine the discussion and reflection that followed. But just as one might expect, the professor was leading up to a bigger question. He asked,

What does make a church The Church? In our class, interestingly, the answers were very similar. In church, we gather around a table, we tell the family stories—i.e. the Holy Scriptures—we encourage one another, forgiveness is offered and received. But, "What

makes a church The Church?" There are the theological answers, "the Gospel is proclaimed, the sacraments are rightly administered, worship occurs regularly..." But I wonder, is that the whole story? I think the key to what makes a church The Church is all of this and more. I think it has a great deal to do with our motivation and what we do with what we have found. Doctrine, bible, rituals, and sacraments are very important. However, I have a feeling there is much more to the story.

What makes a church The Church?

I wonder if for a church to be The Church, the love that is found and lived out there is much more than human emotion and efforts can contain. I wonder if it meets us in our humanness but carries us into the amazing sacrificial holy love of God through Jesus Christ in utterly surprising ways. I wonder if it is no less and no more than the continuous incarnation of that same amazing and holy love lived out in the context of the community, and then brought into the world to be incarnated again and again in word and in deed.

What makes a church The Church? Perhaps it is all of the above and more. As we approach the season of Pentecost—that wonderful time when we recall the Holy Spirit blowing through our ancestors of faith and giving rise to The Church—I wonder what reflecting on how we answer the question for today will bring to new life in us. *I wonder*...




# How do we grow Family of Christ?.....Participate, invite, and welcome!

## **Spiritual Practices for Busy Lives**

With life as crazy busy as it is today, we hunger for the short little windows of peace when we can all get together and reconnect. Why not be deliberate about scheduling those windows into the week and using them to not only grow close as families, but to nurture faith. Faith5 from Faith Incubators is a deliberate process that connects what happens at church to home life. The Faith5: Share, Read, Talk, Pray and Bless is one easy way to get started. Each evening as you gather together, take a little time to share your highs and lows with each other. Listening to each other, celebrating the highs and supporting through the lows can make a huge difference and help everyone to feel connected. Then, take a moment to share a brief bible verse or story--to make it simple, use the insert from the Sunday bulletin readings. See what you notice in the text, imagine what it might have been like to be there when the event happened or to receive the letter from Paul or Peter. Talk about how the text might connect to your family. Close by sharing a family prayer and blessing. Faith5 does not have to take a huge amount of time, but used regularly can become a very special time that the whole family looks forward to. Try it for a few weeks; I'm pretty sure if you do you will want to make it a permanent part of your family life. Faith5 works great between friends too!



# An invitation to participate in a Memorial Service for all of our Friends who have died in the past year and a half since the most recent service that was held in December 2013: Memorial Service for the Homeless Wednesday May 27<sup>th</sup>,11 am St. Paul Lutheran Church 1309 Franklin St Vancouver

"For he [Christ] is our peace; in his flesh he has made both groups into one and has broken down the dividing wall, that is, the hostility between us." - Ephesians 2:14

Dear brothers and sisters in Christ,

We need to talk. Ferguson, Missouri; Norman, Oklahoma; Madison, Wisconsin; Staten Island, New York; and Charlottesville, Virginia: recent events in these and other places prove we are not living in a post-racial society. I know it's difficult to talk about race because too many Americans do not want to believe racism still exists in our country. Yet, as always, Christ promises to be alongside us, even in the most difficult of times, working for our reconciliation. Because of God's promise, we can and must have a deep, honest and even painful conversation about racism.

This month our country commemorated the 50th anniversary of the Selma to Montgomery March and its significance in the passage of the 1965 Voting Rights Act. Lutherans were in Selma to join more than 70,000 people to remember and honor the courage of the veterans of the civil rights movement. Selma symbolized the very best of the human spirit to work cooperatively for change at any cost. Conversely, it also demonstrated the lowest levels of hatred, violence and resistance to change.

Overt forms of racism are no longer legally sanctioned, but the legacy of racism, sadly, endures. Institutional policies and practices still privilege some while limiting access and opportunities to others. Today, the Voting Rights Act has been weakened by the removal of federal oversight of local voting laws and millions of poor and people of color fill the cells of our criminal justice system.

We have said, "Racism – a mix of power, privilege, and prejudice – is sin, a violation of God's intention for humanity." (Freed in Christ: Race, Ethnicity, and Culture, 1993) Ongoing racial justice conversations are occurring and work is happening. But in cases where these are not, we shouldn't wait until another racial event is widely reported before we talk. Here are a number of ways:

- Listen to and learn from the experiences of people of color in your communities.
- Contact the Ethnic Specific and Multicultural Ministries and the Racial Justice Ministries at the churchwide organization. Connect with your synod anti-racism team.
- Be in conversation with your synod bishop and staff. Many of our synods are equipped to help connect you with local resources on anti-racism education and racial justice ministries.
- Learn more about our ongoing racial justice work. This church has helpful guidance in our criminal justice social statement and in the race, ethnicity, and culture social statement.\*
- Advocate for local, state and federal legislation and regulations that guarantee to all citizens the right to vote. Join the ELCA e-Advocacy Network at <a href="https://www.elca.org/advocacy">www.elca.org/advocacy</a>.

As a church called to witness to the Gospel of Jesus Christ, we must continue to listen deeply, to speak out about racial equity and inclusion, to respect and uplift the dignity and humanity of every person and to join with others in organizing for change. In baptism we have become part of the body of Christ and in Christ there is no barrier between us.
