Through the death and resurrection of Jesus, God had overpowered death with life, hate with love, anger with hope, and division with new ways of being in community. Paul encouraged these new communities of faithful folk with these words of wisdom so that they might claim their identity in Christ, be the new creation—the new thing God was doing—and stand up to what ever the storms around them might bring.

In these times, let me give you once more these simple words of wisdom. They are powerful. They are true. They are the way forward.

#### Connecting the Scriptures ~ Building Relationships ~ Transforming our World... Through Confirmation Ministry

**Confirmation Ministry** is what we call our faith formation ministry for young people in the 7<sup>th</sup> & 8<sup>th</sup> grades. The truth is, our young ones have been learning and growing in faith since their baptisms! Parents have lived out the promises they made on that special day by bringing their young ones to worship, Sunday school, and placing into their hands and hearts the holy scriptures. The People of God at FOC have done a great job loving them and modeling what it means to follow Jesus. Great job People of God!

Once a youth enters 7<sup>th</sup> grade, they become all the more aware of the world. Making sense of what they see in the light of the innocent faith they have carried to this point can be very hard. Our young ones have huge questions! Confirmation class is a safe place to explore those questions and to challenge and bring the ideas and ideals of the Christian faith to the task. This year we will be using the *Colaborate Lutheran Confirmation* curriculum to help us along the way. Check it out at www.augsburgfortress.org/Colaborate-Lutheran-Confirmation.

Confirmation class gathers on *Sunday morning at 10:00 A.M. and Wednesday evenings from 6:00-7:00 P.M.* to explore the scriptures and Luther's Small Catechism by connecting the texts to our observations, experiences and lives. It's not just class work and studying! Along the way, our youth grow strong friendships with each other and wonderful relationships with the adult mentors that work with them. Our confirmation youth participate in service projects and fun activities all designed to foster faith and healthy relationships. This year, we hope to bring back our Confirmation Camp/Retreat. Stay tuned for more info on that and other great events!

Once the youth complete this two-year program at the end of 8<sup>th</sup> grade, they are invited to make a public *affirmation of their baptism* on Pentecost/Confirmation Sunday in which they share their faith and make a commitment to continue in the promises of their baptism and take their places as full members of the Body of Christ here at FOC.



**November 1 at 6 p.m.** we'll have a semi annual meeting in the Family Room after dinner to talk about upcoming events. We invite everyone interested in our programs to come join us. We are open to all new ideas of how to make our events better and we need all the help we can get.

The ads for inexpensive turkeys come out in the paper around November 12 before Thanksgiving and that's when we invite everyone to purchase turkeys for us and bring them to church to store in our freezer for our Christmas food boxes for needy families. Our goal each year is 100 boxes to be divided between 4 downtown schools who provide us with names of families who need help during the holidays. The shelves will go up Nov. 1 in the Family Room to store Christmas box trimmings of food so please plan to fill the shelves for the 100 food boxes.

The last week of November, the 26th through December 3rd, we will partner with Bethel Lutheran and All Saints Episcopal to staff the Winter Hospitality Overflow or WHO shelter for single women and families at St. Andrew Lutheran Church. Our shifts will be Friday December 1 morning shift for 6 people, the evening shift of that day for 4-6 people and overnight for 2 people. The same shifts for Saturday and early morning for Sunday Dec. 3. So that's

only 7 shifts for Family of Christ and we should have no trouble filling the shifts. Please plan to help. It's heartwarming. Sign up sheets will go up mid-October.

**Dec. 16 we will gather at 9 a.m.** to fill the Christmas food boxes in the Family Room.

**Dec. 17th, Sunday,** we'll gather in the Family Room following 2nd service to pick up food boxes and deliver them to needy families.

**Dec. 30 is our day** to volunteer at St. Paul Lutheran Church for the men's shelter for the WHO. We will only have 3 shifts, evening Saturday, overnight Saturday and early morning Sunday the 31st. The sign up sheets will be self explanatory and go up in plenty of time for you to get your favorite spot. We will also need food for both volunteer opportunities for the WHO.

#### The Reformation's Gift of Engagement in Public Life

These are politically charged times. Americans hold significantly different views about the proper role of government in caring for its citizens and about the proper role of the church as it



relates to the state and as advocates for the most vulnerable in our society. In these charged times, I think it is helpful to consider two things: the relationship between church and state, and how Christians participate in a civil society.

Often, we speak about the "separation of church and state." This principle is sometimes raised when parishioners feel that their pastors of church are being too "political." The assumption is that the church should only deal with the spiritual and that it should have nothing to do with civil and political life. The First Amendment says, "Congress shall make no law respecting the establishment of religion, or prohibiting the free exercise thereof." The separation of church and state is intended to protect religious liberty and keep the government from interfering in the church.

In this 500th anniversary year of the Reformation, the thinking and teaching of a 16th century German monk are remarkably relevant. Martin Luther formulated the doctrine of two kingdoms--the temporal and the spiritual.

Luther's doctrine of the two kingdoms has been misinterpreted to mean the temporal realm is inferior to the spiritual, or that God--and therefore the faithful---should not be concerned with the temporal. In this mistaken notion, the temporal is not to be allowed into the church, and the faithful

really need not to be too engaged in the public square.

What Luther was trying to get across was that the church and the state, the spiritual and the temporal, are *both* established by God and are *both* part of God's two-fold rule. "Give us today our daily bread" we are also praying that God send us the gift of good government. (Luther's Small Catechism).

Both church and state are gifts from God and have been established for specific purposes. The proper work of the church is to "preach the gospel in its purity and administer the sacraments according to the gospel" (Augsburg Confession).

The proper work of the state is to keep peace and order and to support and nourish the lives of its citizens. And, since we confess that God entered human life through the incarnation of Jesus Christ--who took our flesh upon himself--we do not have a hierarchy of value that places the spiritual about the temporal.

Active participation in public life and the duty of the government to care for its people---especially the most vulnerable--have been hallmarks of the Reformation movement from its very beginning.

In his explanation of "give us today our daily bread" in the Lord's Prayer, Luther says that, "It would be therefore fitting that the coat of arms of every upright prince were emblazoned with a loaf of bread instead of a lion" (Large Catechism). In commenting on Psalm 82, Luther wrote that the "second virtue of a prince is to help the poor, the orphans, and the widows to justice and to further their cause." Christians do not withdraw from public life. We fulfill our baptismal vocation when we keep showing up.




